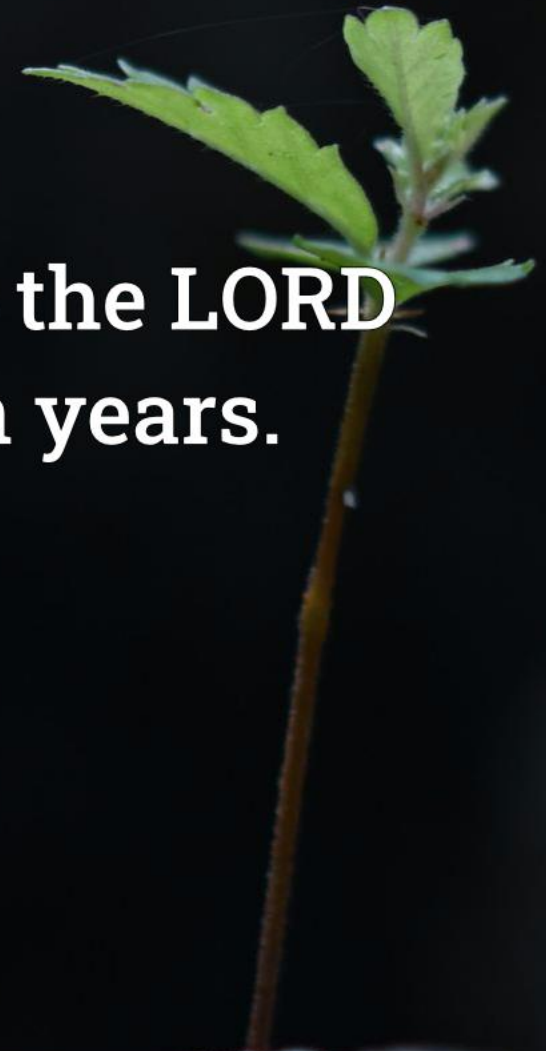
# 1: The Situation (Judges 6:1-5)





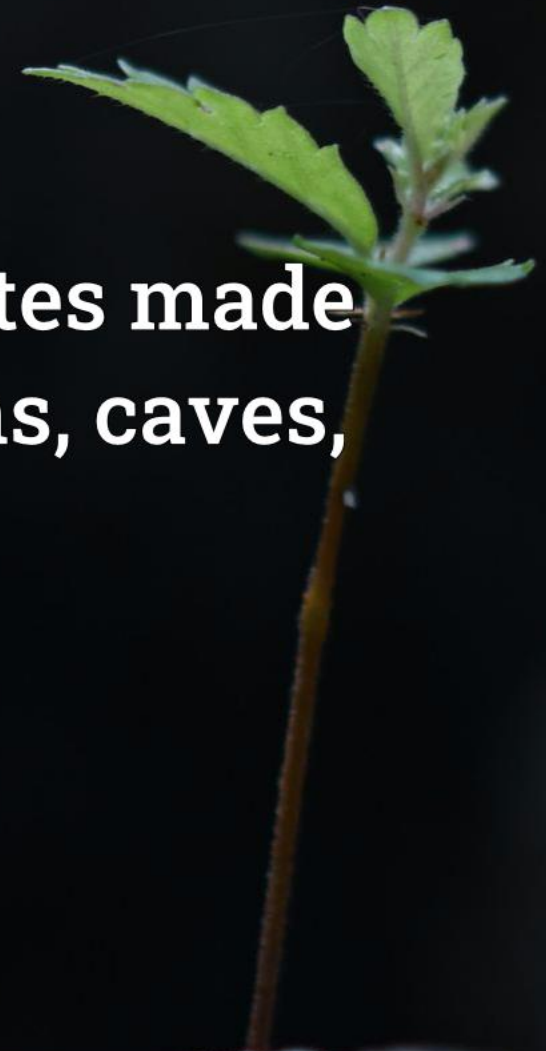
## Judges 6:1-5 (NLT)

<sup>1</sup>The Israelites did evil in the LORD's sight. So the LORD handed them over to the Midianites for seven years.



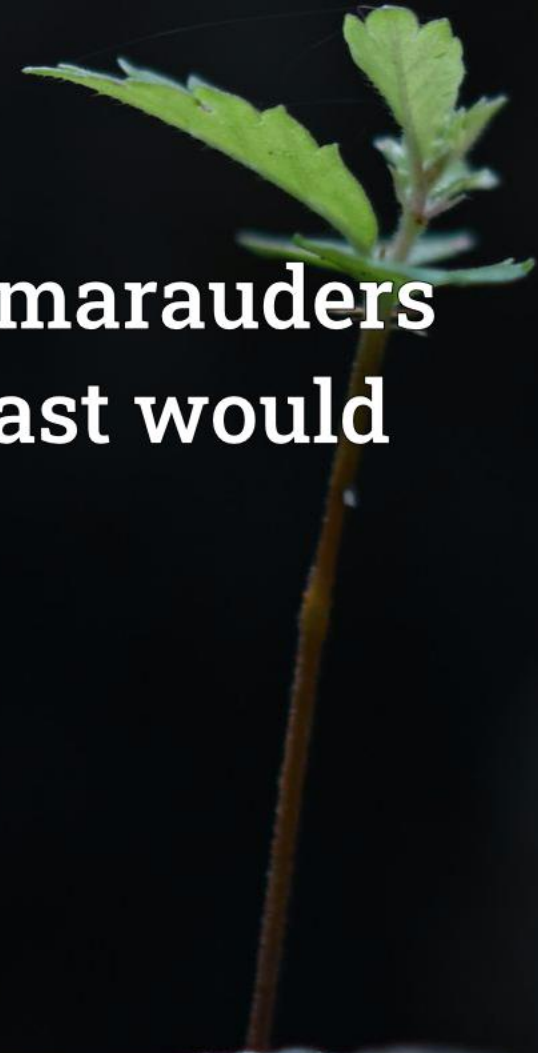
## Judges 6:1-5 (NLT)

## Judges 6:1-5 (NLT)

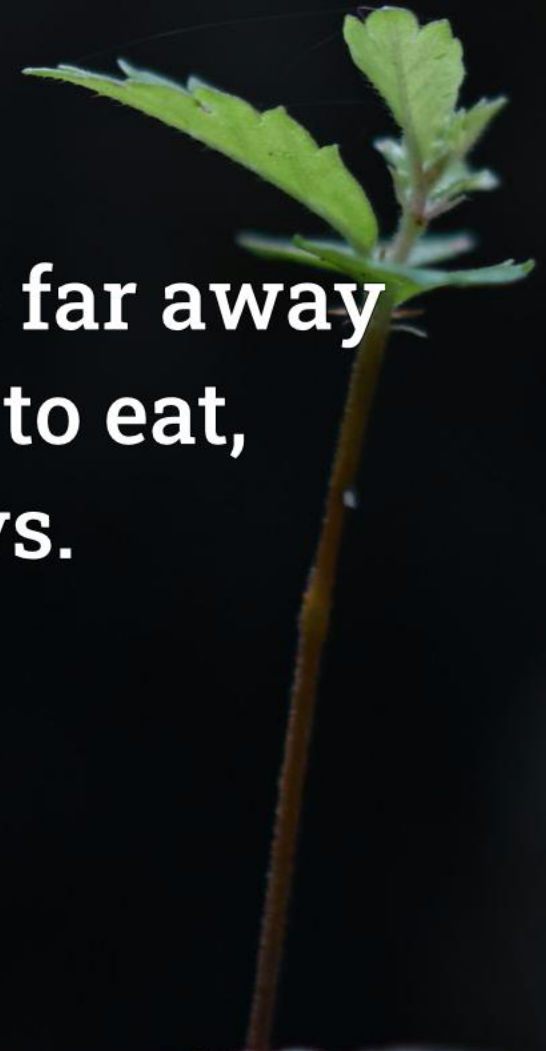
<sup>3</sup>Whenever the Israelites planted their crops, marauders from Midian, Amalek, and the people of the east would attack Israel,





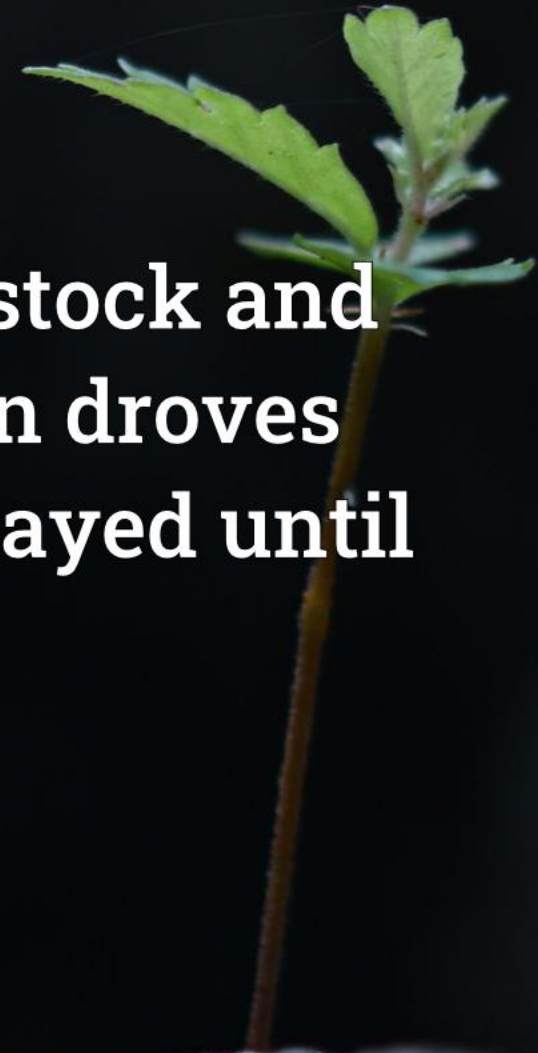
## Judges 6:1-5 (NLT)

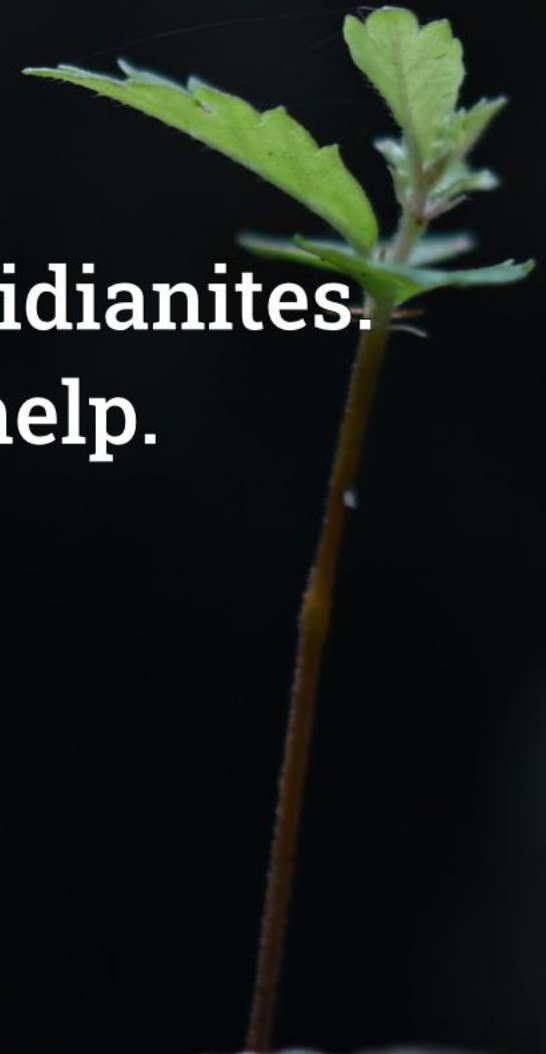

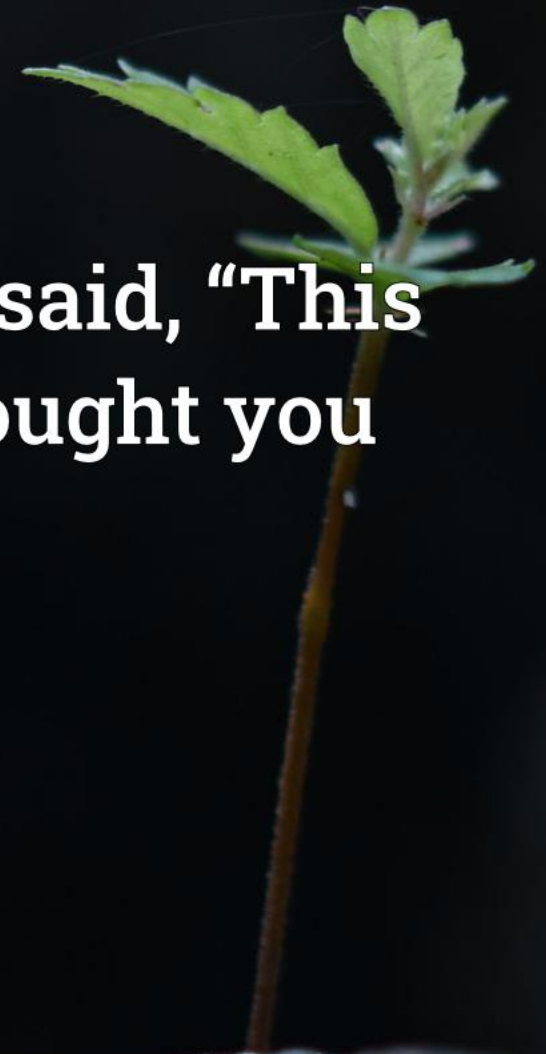
<sup>7</sup>When they cried out to the LORD because of Midian,





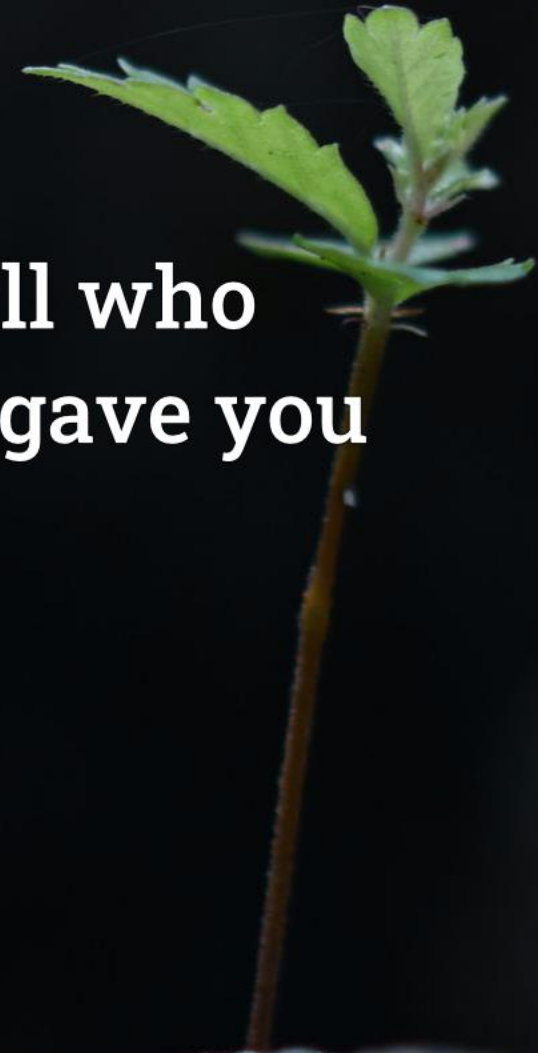
## Judges 6:7-10 (NLT)

**8**the LORD sent a prophet to the Israelites. He said, “This is what the LORD, the God of Israel, says: I brought you up out of slavery in Egypt.



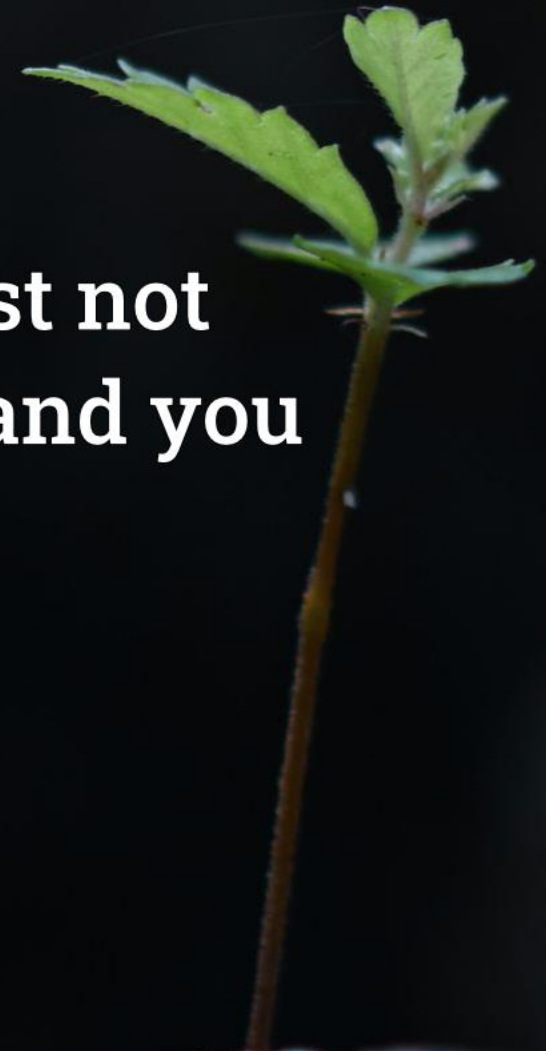
## Judges 6:7-10 (NLT)

<sup>10</sup>I told you, 'I am the LORD your God. You must not worship the gods of the Amorites, in whose land you now live.' But you have not listened to me."



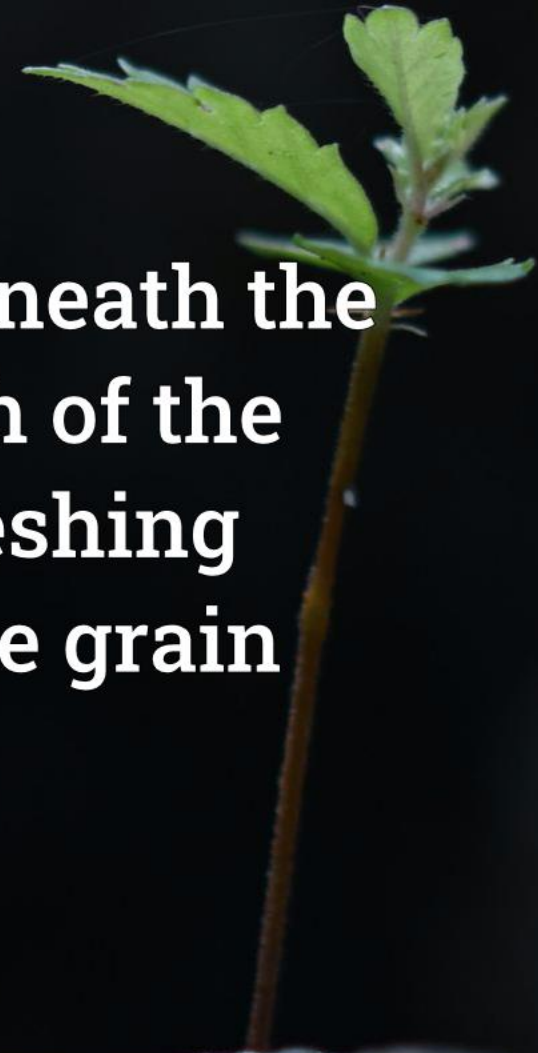


## **4: God Calls Gideon (Judges 6:11-24)**



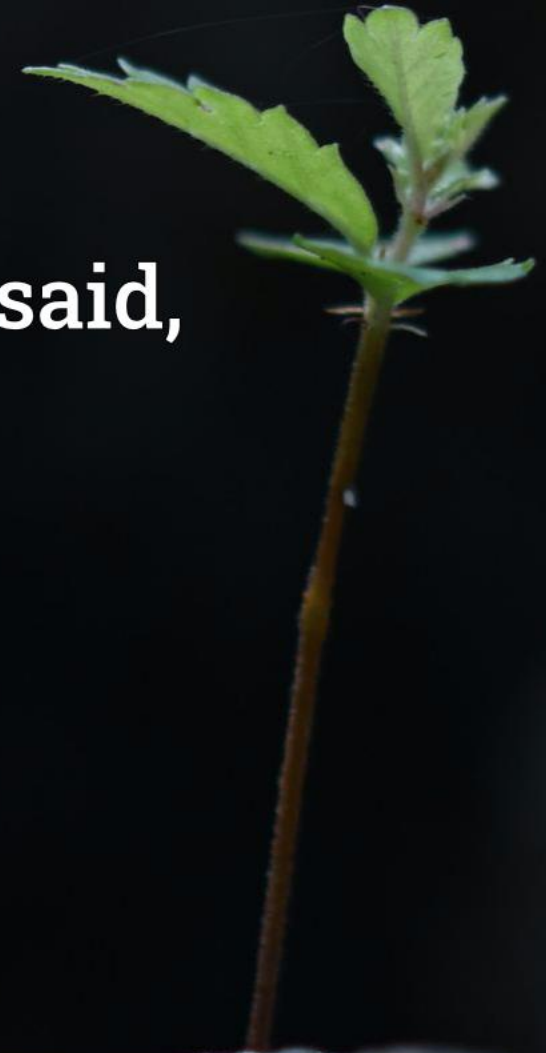
## Judges 6:11-24 (NLT)

**<sup>11</sup>Then the angel of the LORD came and sat beneath the great tree at Ophrah, which belonged to Joash of the clan of Abiezer. Gideon son of Joash was threshing wheat at the bottom of a winepress to hide the grain from the Midianites.**



## Judges 6:11-24 (NLT)

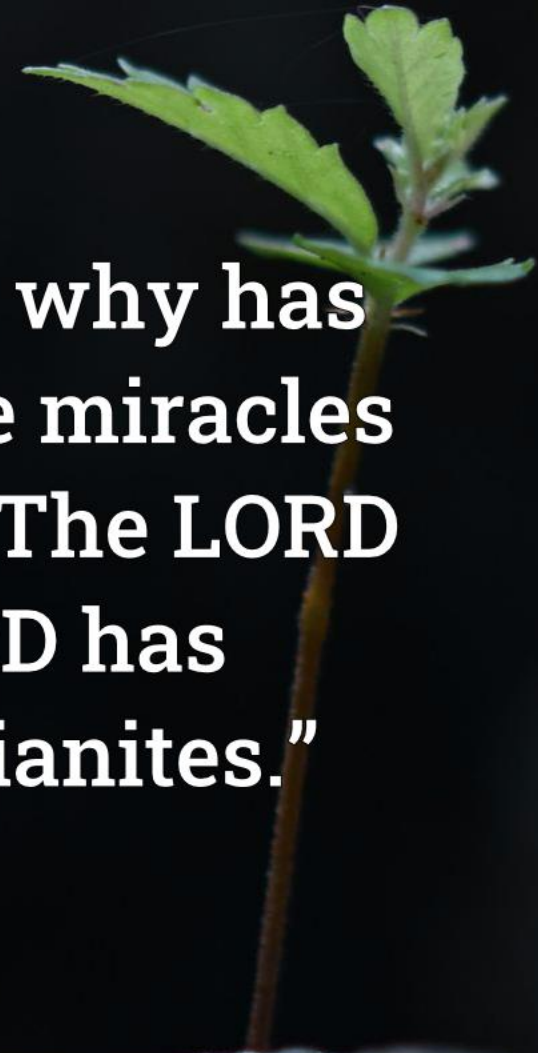
<sup>12</sup>The angel of the LORD appeared to him and said,  
“Mighty hero, the LORD is with you!”





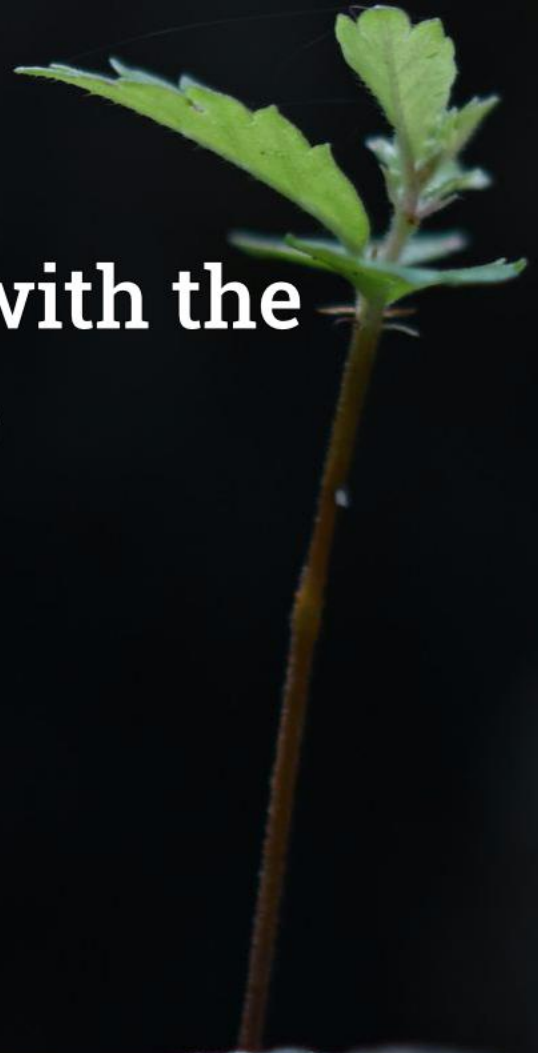
## Judges 6:11-24 (NLT)

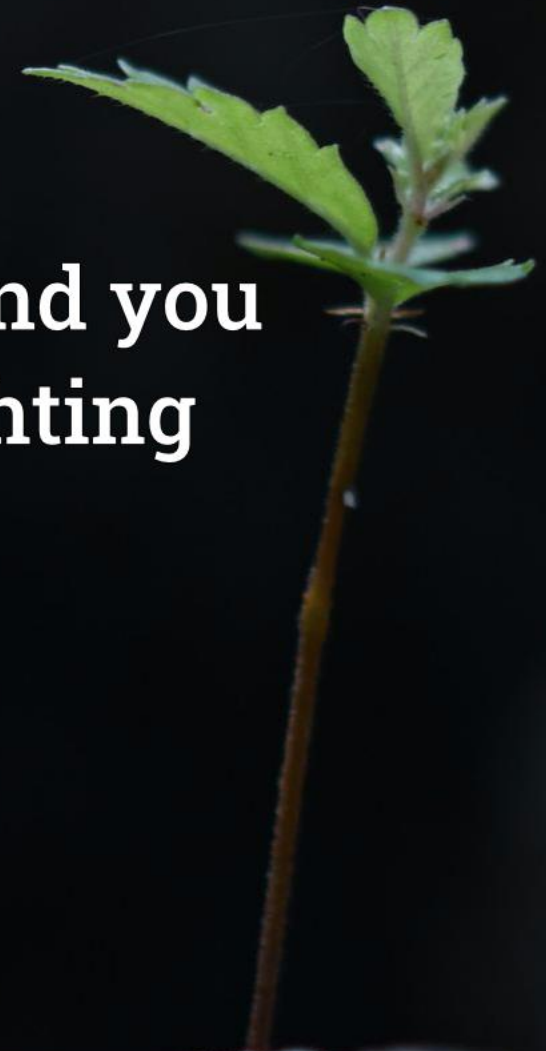

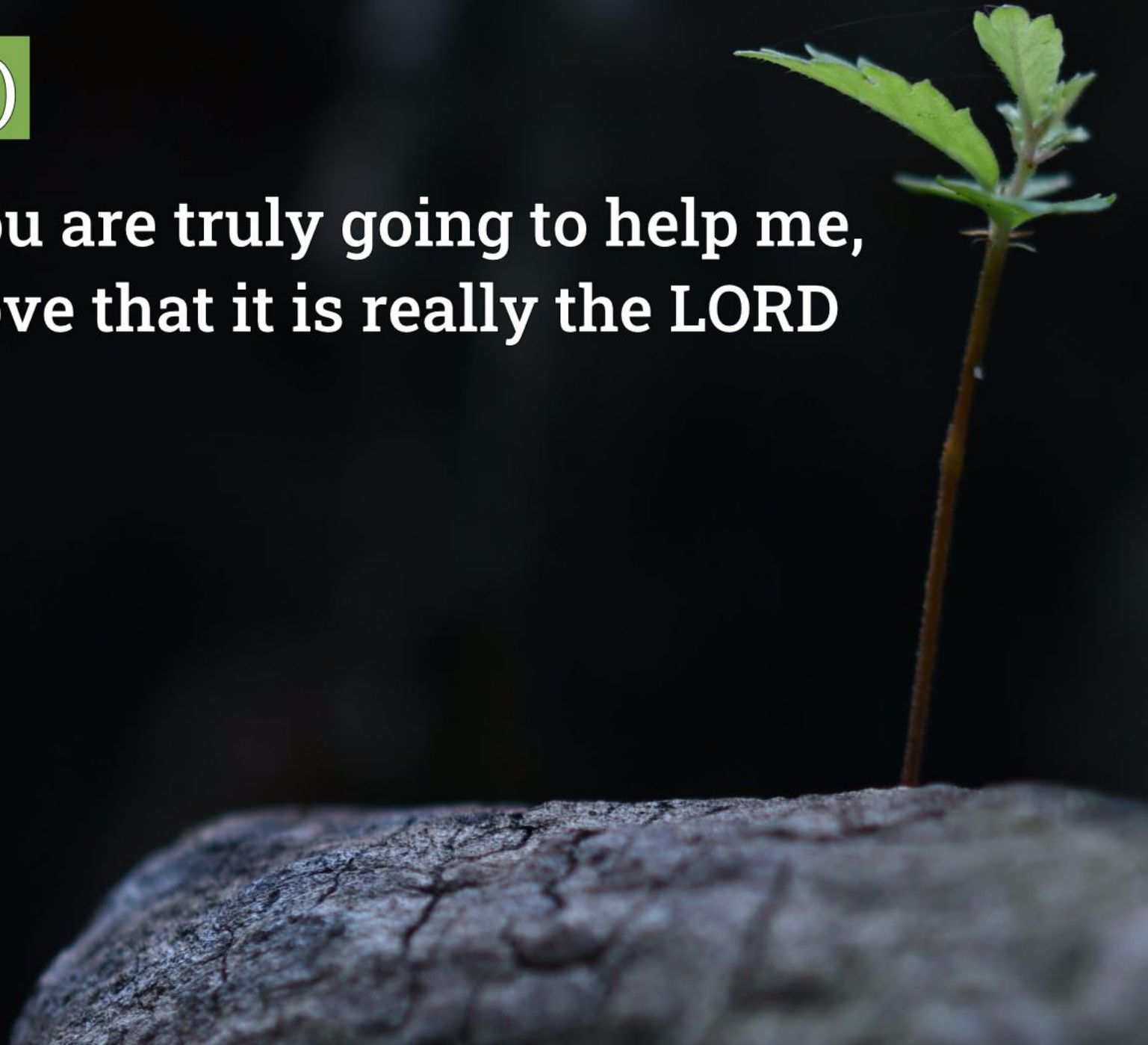
## Judges 6:11-24 (NLT)

## Judges 6:11-24 (NLT)

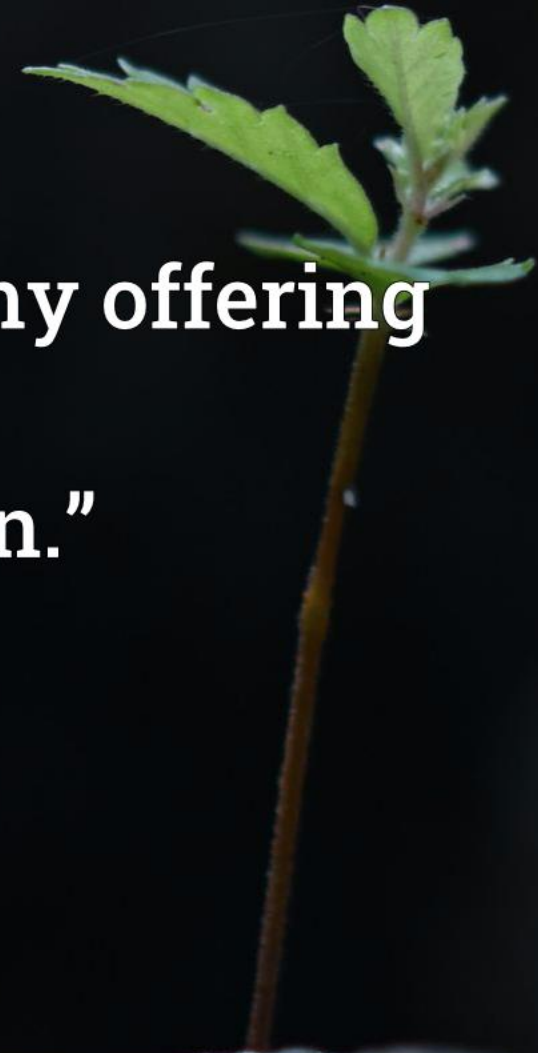
<sup>17</sup>Gideon replied, "If you are truly going to help me, show me a sign to prove that it is really the LORD speaking to me."

<sup>18</sup>Don't go away until I come back and bring my offering to you."

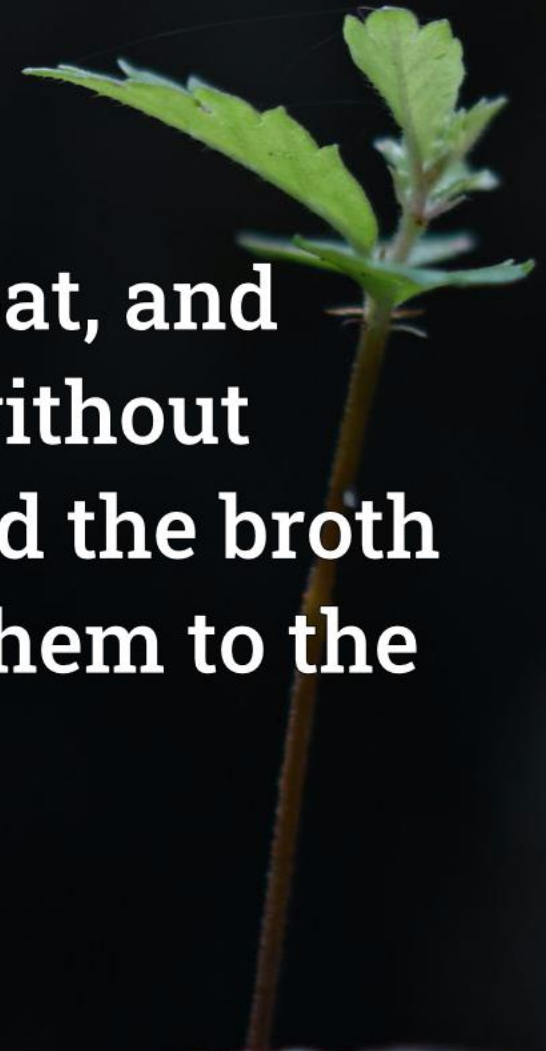
He answered, "I will stay here until you return."





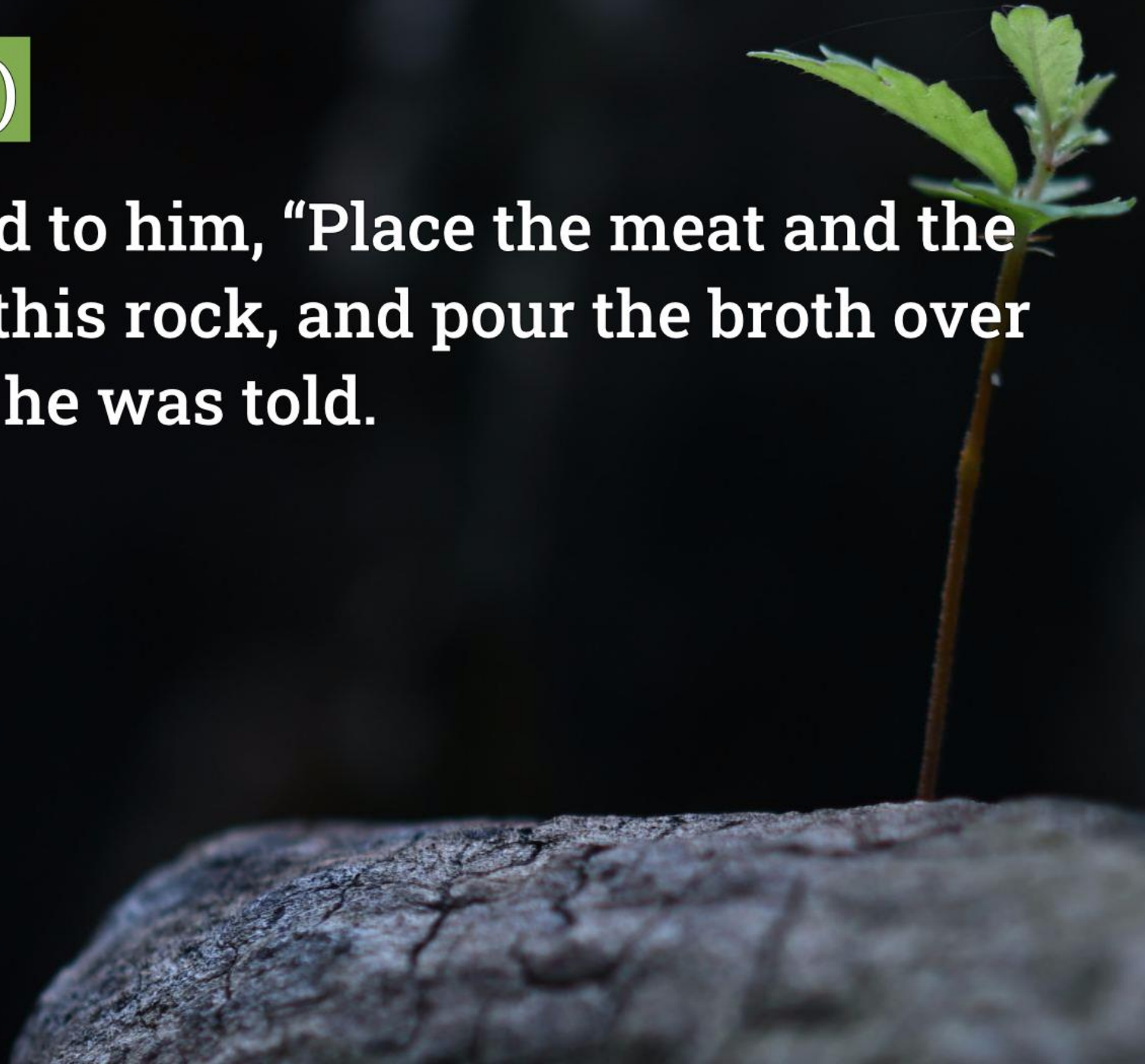
## Judges 6:11-24 (NLT)

## Judges 6:11-24 (NLT)

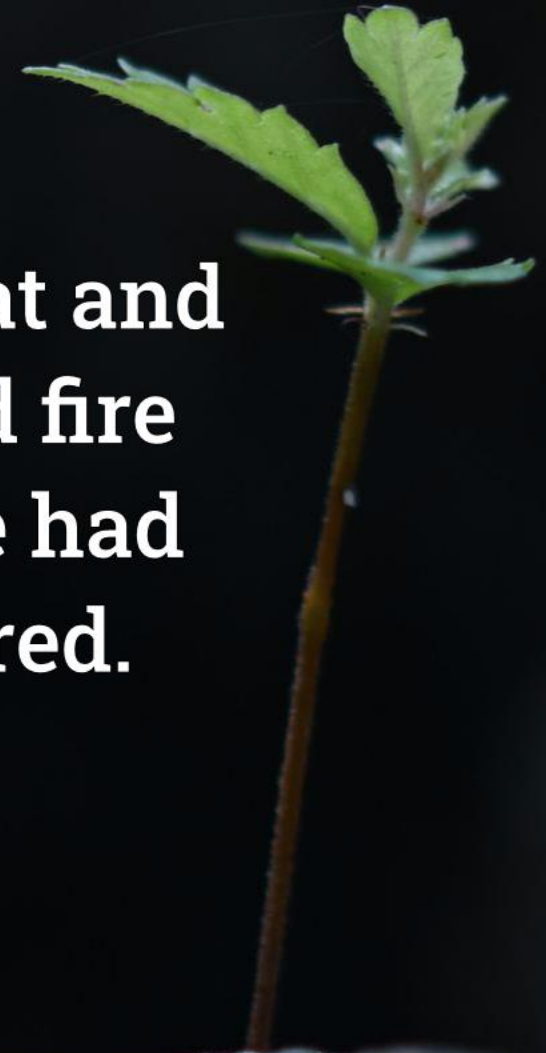

## Judges 6:11-24 (NLT)

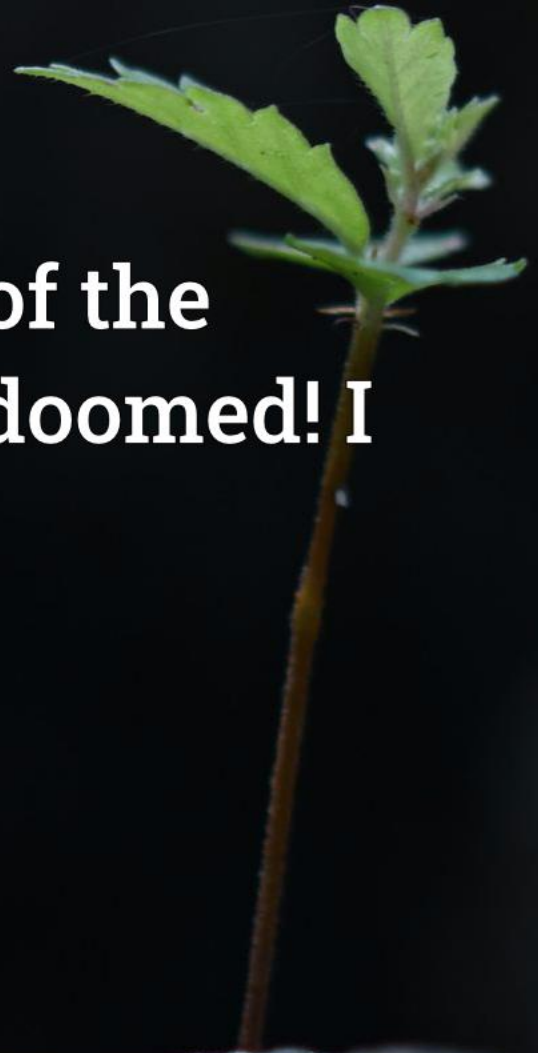

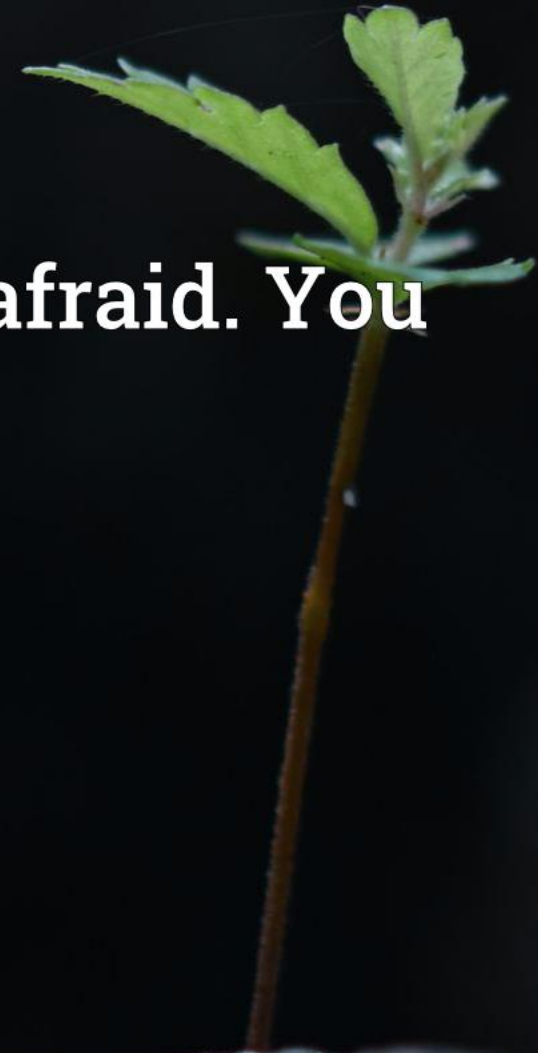
## Judges 6:11-24 (NLT)

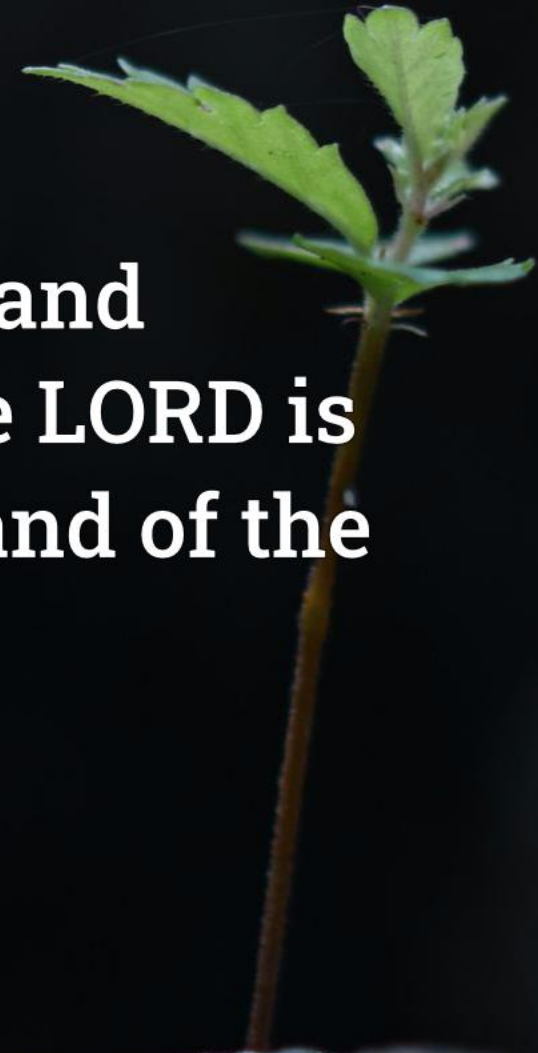
## Judges 6:11-24 (NLT)

<sup>23</sup>“It is all right,” the LORD replied. “Do not be afraid. You will not die.”



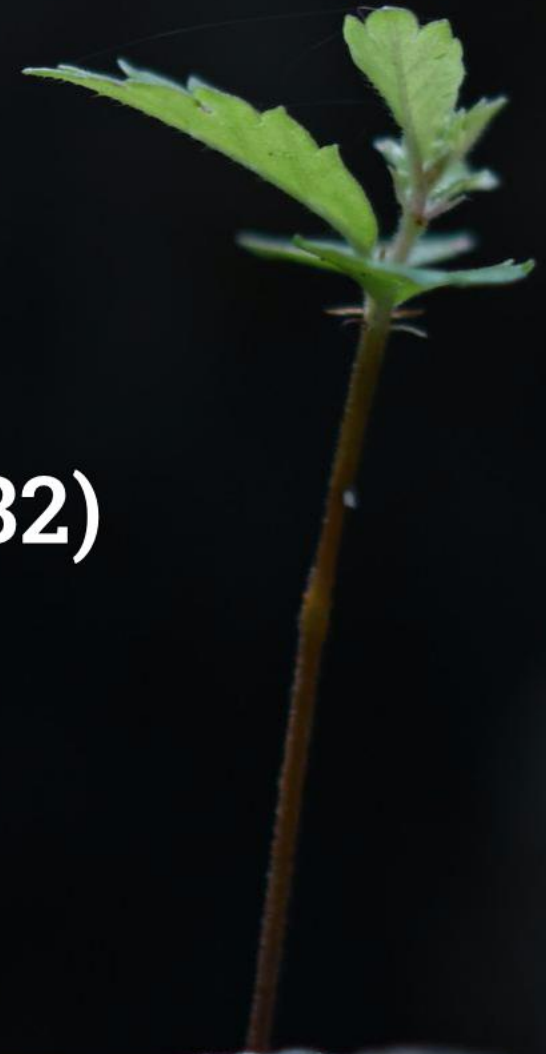
## Judges 6:11-24 (NLT)

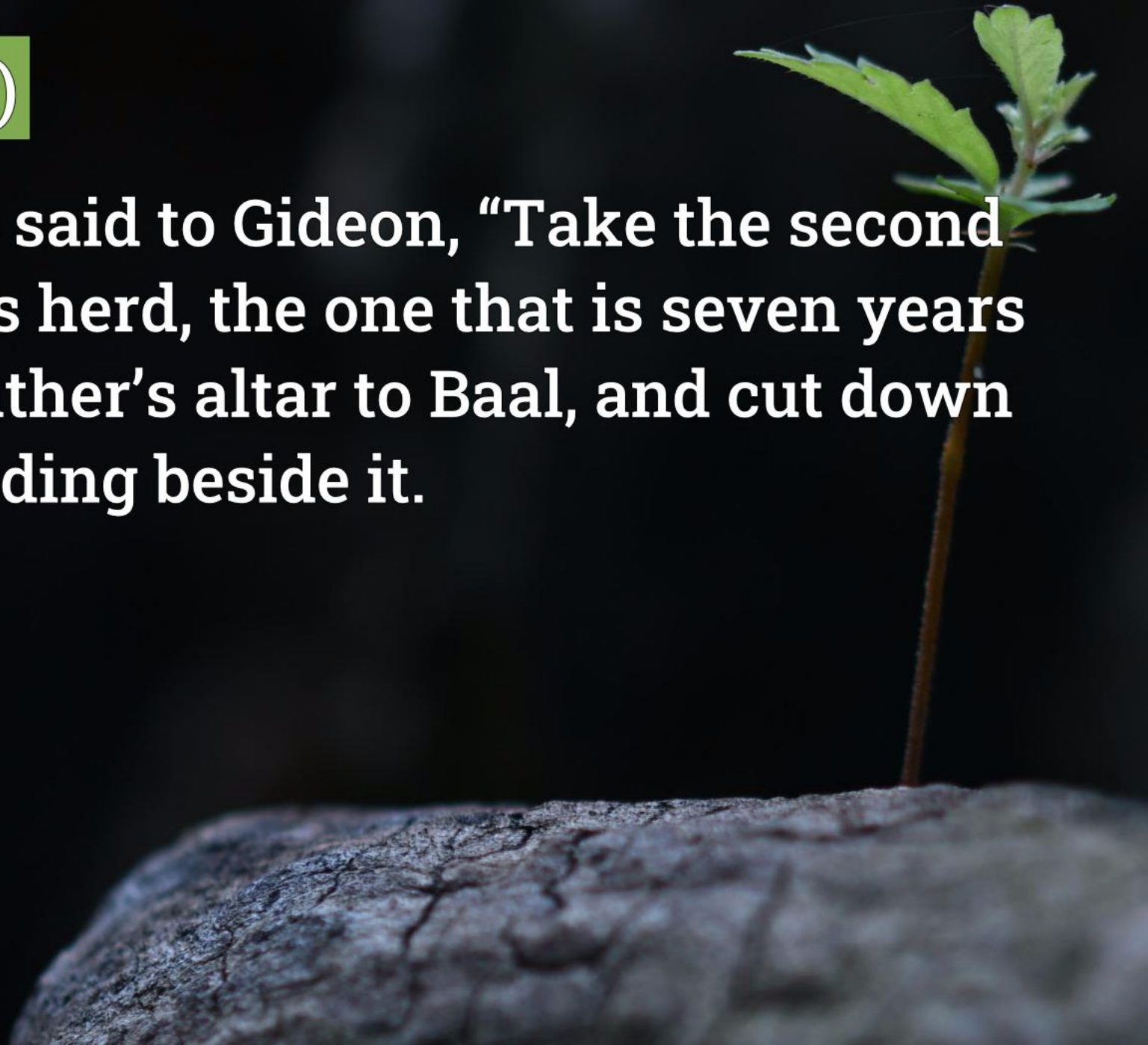


## **5: Gideon's First Assignment (Judges 6:25-32)**



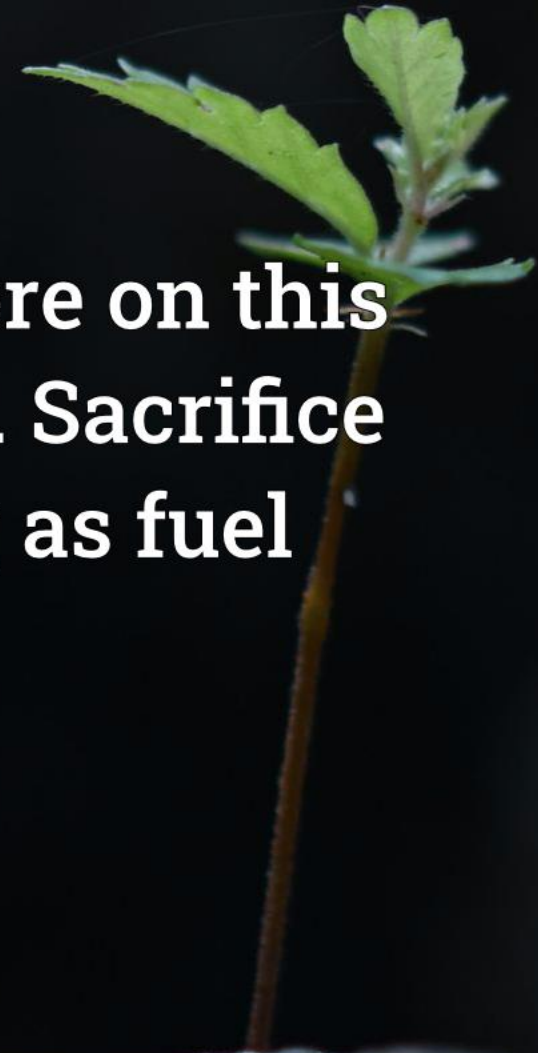
## Judges 6:25-32 (NLT)

<sup>25</sup>That night the LORD said to Gideon, “Take the second bull from your father’s herd, the one that is seven years old. Pull down your father’s altar to Baal, and cut down the Asherah pole standing beside it.”



## Judges 6:25-32 (NLT)

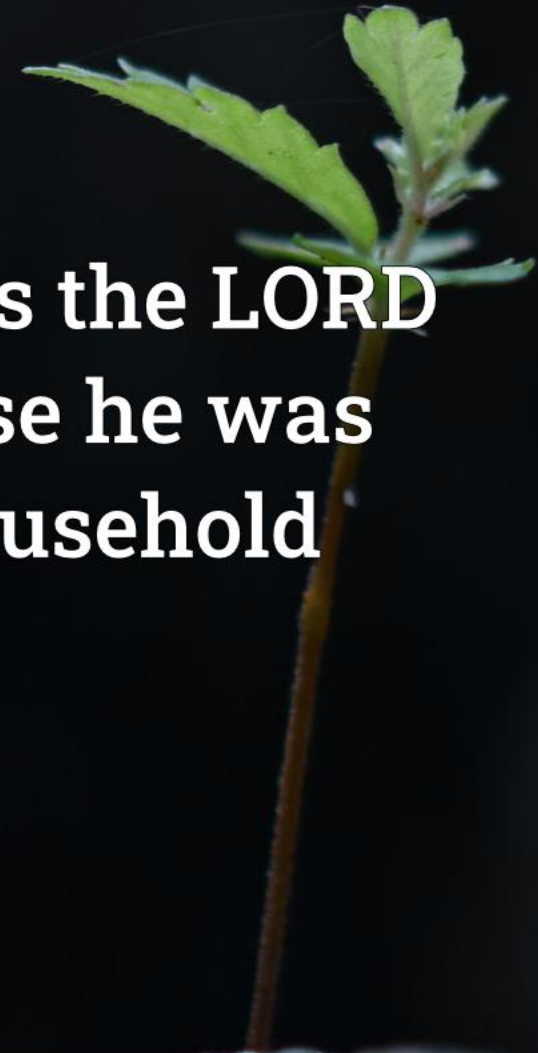
**<sup>26</sup>Then build an altar to the LORD your God here on this hilltop sanctuary, laying the stones carefully. Sacrifice the bull as a burnt offering on the altar, using as fuel the wood of the Asherah pole you cut down.”**





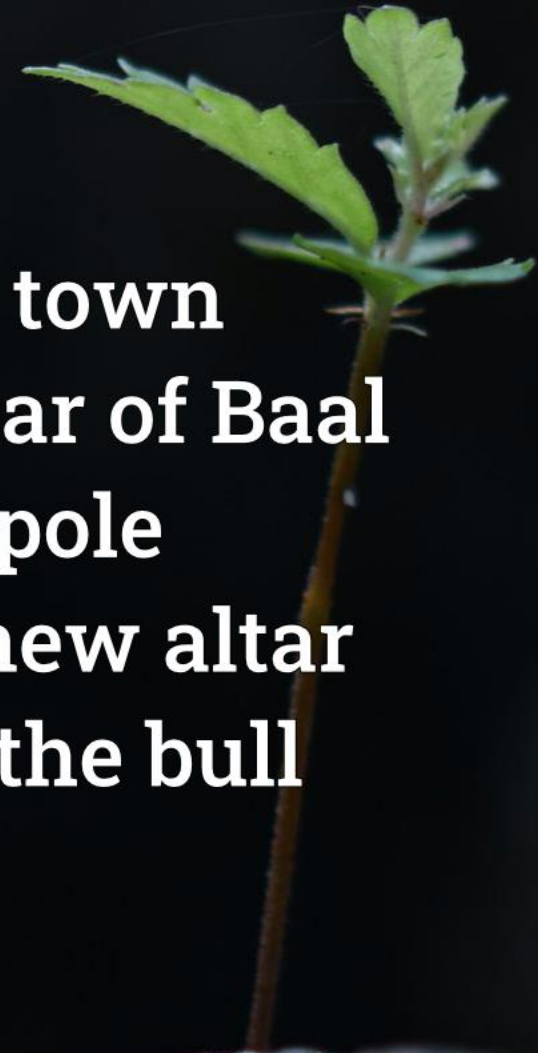
## Judges 6:25-32 (NLT)

<sup>27</sup>So Gideon took ten of his servants and did as the LORD had commanded. But he did it at night because he was afraid of the other members of his father's household and the people of the town.



## Judges 6:25-32 (NLT)

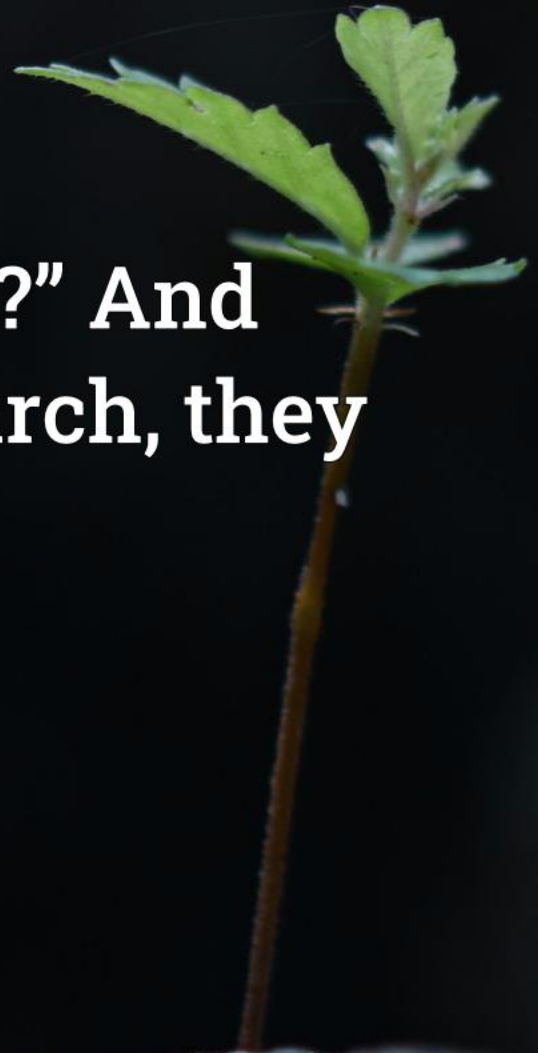
**28**Early the next morning, as the people of the town began to stir, someone discovered that the altar of Baal had been broken down and that the Asherah pole beside it had been cut down. In their place a new altar had been built, and on it were the remains of the bull that had been sacrificed.





## Judges 6:25-32 (NLT)

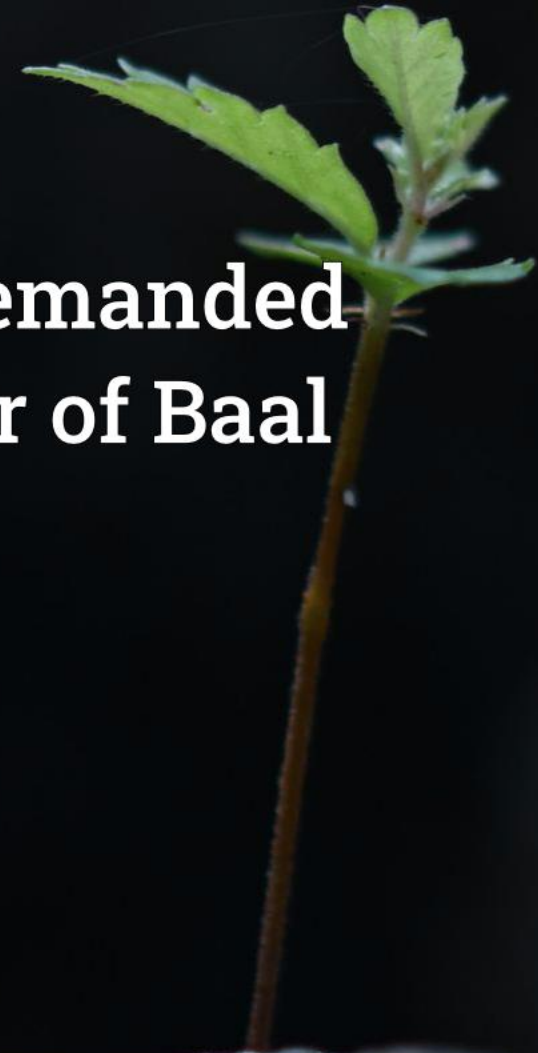
**29**The people said to each other, “Who did this?” And after asking around and making a careful search, they learned that it was Gideon, the son of Joash.






## Judges 6:25-32 (NLT)

<sup>30</sup>“Bring out your son,” the men of the town demanded of Joash. “He must die for destroying the altar of Baal and for cutting down the Asherah pole.”



## Judges 6:25-32 (NLT)

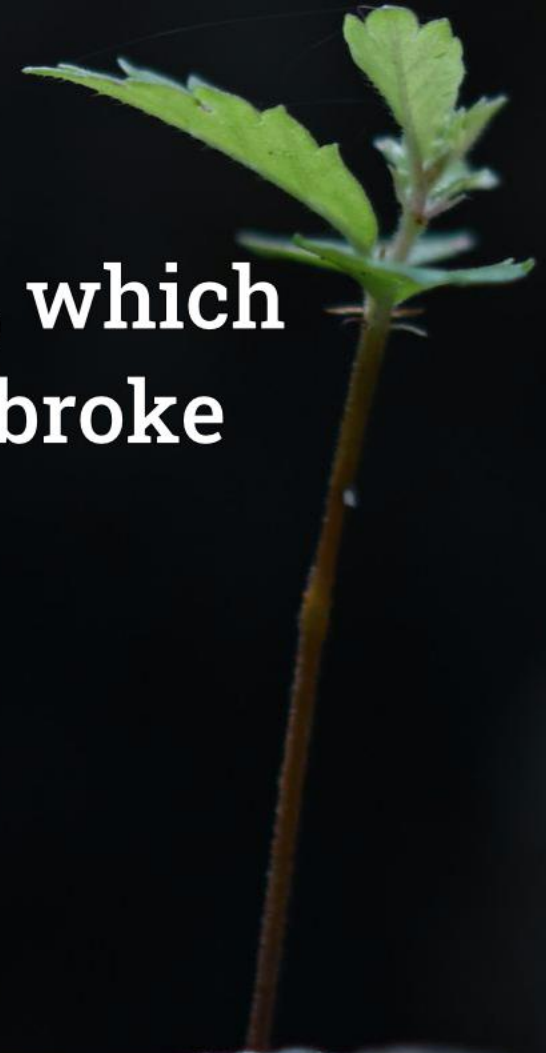
**<sup>31</sup>But Joash shouted to the mob that confronted him, “Why are you defending Baal? Will you argue his case? Whoever pleads his case will be put to death by morning! If Baal truly is a god, let him defend himself and destroy the one who broke down his altar!”**
